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

ROSARY, PRAYER WITH MARY
DEVOTEES OF MARY TO BECOME DISCIPLES OF CHRIST

“CHRISTIANITY IS THE ONLY RELIGION THAT NEEDS A MOTHER” said the celebrated theologian Karl Rahner. In the world of male superiority-complex and patriarchal power, Mary, a woman found a very exalted place in the plan of God and in the life of the Church. During the month of October very many Catholics recite the Rosary with emotion and piety. I would say that those who found the daily-praying of the rosary have found a great treasure as the Bible says in Mathew 13: 44-45. Some people, like the farmer might discover this hidden treasure by tradition or like the merchant by search. Whatever, those who pray the rosary rejoice that they have found a priceless diamond.



Christianity is founded on the Incarnation of God, which required a Mother. Mary’s journey of Motherhood began from the moment of her fiat at the Annunciation and proceeded with the visitation to Elizabeth, nativity of Jesus, flight to Egypt, return to Nazareth, Jerusalem for the sake of the Son of God. With eyes wide open for the needs of the neighbour/s at Cana, she was very sensitive like any Mother and pleaded for their dire need of wine at the sacred feast of marriage. Mary’s entire life was and is an expedition of faith with Jesus. She did not understand God’s plan fully well. Yet she always submitted all through her life. We could notice her agony already when Jesus was twelve (Lk 2: 41-51). As we pray the Joyful mysteries, we could meditate together with Mary on our conception, birth, Infancy and childhood and the intermingling of ups and downs in life and how our parents cooperated with God in giving life cum faith and nurturing. Mary’s first, the last and the shortest sermon ‘do whatever he (my beloved Son) tells you’ (Jn 2: 5).

Pope John Paul II introduced the luminous mysteries, which begin with the mysteries when Jesus began his public redemptive ministry. The first sermon of Yahweh is similar to that of Mary’s ‘This is my beloved Son, Listen to Him” (Lk 9:35). How wonderful to take note of Mary’s sermon is the echo of the Father’s voice. Jesus recognizes in Mary’s voice, His Father’s will and begins his public ministry. The disciples believed after the water was changed into wine (Jn 2:11b). Mary believed before the miracle itself and therefore, her

faith, through the first of all the miracles gave birth to the faith of the disciples! The other mysteries are the central aspects of the Jesus redemptive mystery and therefore, we could pray with Mary, whose journey continued all through Jesus' public ministry.



Let us pray not merely mechanically but with faith and devotion so that we, the devotees of Mary become truly the Disciples of Christ. Mary's wish is precisely that and, indeed more than that is to become missionaries by giving Christ to the world like her. Let us imbibe the spirit of the Saints of October like St. Theresa of Child Jesus, Francis of Assisi, Holy Rosary, St. Theresa of Avila, World Mission Sunday, Sts. Simon and Jude and collaborate with God's plan of redemption.

I. POPE'S VANI

World Mission Sunday

2015 takes place in the context of the Year of Consecrated Life, which provides a further stimulus for prayer and reflection. For if every baptized person is called to bear witness to the Lord Jesus by proclaiming the faith received as a gift, this is especially so for each consecrated man and woman. There is a clear connection between consecrated life and mission. The desire to follow Jesus closely, which led to the emergence of consecrated life in the Church, responds to his call to take up the cross and follow him, to imitate his dedication to the Father and his service and love, to lose our life so as to gain it. Since Christ's entire existence had a missionary character, so too, all those who follow him closely must possess this missionary quality.



The missionary dimension, which belongs to the very nature of the Church, is also intrinsic to all forms of consecrated life, and cannot be neglected without detracting from and disfiguring its charism. Being a missionary is not about proselytizing or mere strategy; mission is part of the "grammar" of faith, something essential for those who listen to the voice of the Spirit who whispers "Come" and "Go forth". Those who follow Christ cannot

fail to be missionaries, for they know that Jesus “walks with them, speaks to them, breathes with them. They sense Jesus alive with them in the midst of the missionary enterprise” (Evangelii Gaudium, 266).

Mission is a passion for Jesus and at the same time a passion for his people. When we pray before Jesus crucified, we see the depth of his love which gives us dignity and sustains us. At the same time, we realize that the love flowing from Jesus’ pierced heart expands to embrace the People of God and all humanity. We realize once more that he wants to make use of us to draw closer to his beloved people (cf. *ibid.*, 268) and all those who seek him with a sincere heart. In Jesus’ command to “go forth”, we see the scenarios and ever-present new challenges of the Church’s evangelizing mission. All her members are called to proclaim the Gospel by their witness of life. In a particular way, consecrated men and women are asked to listen to the voice of the Spirit who calls them to go to the peripheries, to those to whom the Gospel has not yet been proclaimed.

The fiftieth anniversary of the Second Vatican Council’s Decree *Ad Gentes* is an invitation to all of us to reread this document and to reflect on its contents. The Decree called for a powerful missionary impulse in Institutes of Consecrated Life. For contemplative communities, Saint Theresa of the Child Jesus, Patroness of the Missions, appears in a new light; she speaks with renewed eloquence and inspires reflection upon the deep connection between contemplative life and mission. For many active religious communities, the missionary impulse which emerged from the Council was met with an extraordinary openness to the mission *ad gentes*, often accompanied by an openness to brothers and sisters from the lands and cultures encountered in evangelization, to the point that today one can speak of a widespread “interculturalism” in the consecrated life. Hence there is an urgent need to reaffirm that the central ideal of mission is Jesus Christ, and that this ideal demands the total gift of oneself to the proclamation of the Gospel. On this point there can be no compromise: those who by God’s grace accept the mission, are called to live the mission. For them, the proclamation of Christ in the many peripheries of the world becomes their way of following him, one which more than repays them for the many difficulties and sacrifices they make. Any tendency to deviate from this vocation, even if motivated by noble reasons due to countless pastoral, ecclesial or humanitarian needs, is not consistent with the Lord’s call to be personally at the service of the Gospel. In Missionary Institutes, formators are called to indicate clearly and frankly this plan of life and action, and to discern authentic missionary vocations. I appeal in particular to young people, who are capable of courageous witness and generous deeds, even when these are countercultural: Do not allow others to rob you of the ideal of a true mission, of following Jesus through the total gift of yourself. In the depths of your conscience, ask yourself why you chose the religious missionary life and take stock of your readiness to accept it for what it is: a gift of love at the service of the proclamation of the Gospel. Remember that, even before being necessary for those who have not yet heard it, the proclamation of the Gospel is a necessity for those who love the Master.

Today, the Church’s mission is faced by the challenge of meeting the needs of all people to return to their roots and to protect the values of their respective cultures. This means

knowing and respecting other traditions and philosophical systems, and realizing that all peoples and cultures have the right to be helped from within their own traditions to enter into the mystery of God's wisdom and to accept the Gospel of Jesus, who is light and transforming strength for all cultures.

Within this complex dynamic, we ask ourselves: "Who are the first to whom the Gospel message must be proclaimed?" The answer, found so often throughout the Gospel, is clear: it is the poor, the little ones and the sick, those who are often looked down upon or forgotten, those who cannot repay us (cf. Lk 14:13-14). Evangelization directed preferentially to the least among us is a sign of the Kingdom that Jesus came to bring: "There is an inseparable bond between our faith and the poor. May we never abandon them" (*Evangelii Gaudium*, 48). This must be clear above all to those who embrace the consecrated missionary life: by the vow of poverty, they choose to follow Christ in his preference for the poor, not ideologically, but in the same way that he identified himself with the poor: by living like them amid the uncertainties of everyday life and renouncing all claims to power, and in this way to become brothers and sisters of the poor, bringing them the witness of the joy of the Gospel and a sign of God's love.

Living as Christian witnesses and as signs of the Father's love among the poor and underprivileged, consecrated persons are called to promote the presence of the lay faithful in the service of Church's mission. As the Second Vatican Council stated: "The laity should cooperate in the Church's work of evangelization; as witnesses and at the same time as living instruments, they share in her saving mission" (*Ad Gentes*, 41). Consecrated missionaries need to generously welcome those who are willing to work with them, even for a limited period of time, for an experience in the field. They are brothers and sisters who want to share the missionary vocation inherent in Baptism. The houses and structures of the missions are natural places to welcome them and to provide for their human, spiritual and apostolic support.

The Church's Institutes and Missionary Congregations are completely at the service of those who do not know the Gospel of Jesus. This means that they need to count on the charisms and missionary commitment of their consecrated members. But consecrated men and women also need a structure of service, an expression of the concern of the Bishop of Rome, in order to ensure *koinonia*, for cooperation and synergy are an integral part of the missionary witness. Jesus made the unity of his disciples a condition so that the world may believe (cf. Jn 17:21). This convergence is not the same as legalism or institutionalism, much less a stifling of the creativity of the Spirit, who inspires diversity. It is about giving a greater fruitfulness to the Gospel message and promoting that unity of purpose which is also the fruit of the Spirit.

The Missionary Societies of the Successor of Peter have a universal apostolic horizon. This is why they also need the many charisms of consecrated life, to address the vast horizons of evangelization and to be able to ensure adequate presence in whatever lands they are sent.

Dear brothers and sisters, a true missionary is passionate for the Gospel. Saint Paul said: “Woe to me if I do not preach the Gospel!” (1 Cor 9:16). The Gospel is the source of joy, liberation and salvation for all men and women. The Church is aware of this gift, and therefore she ceaselessly proclaims to everyone “what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes” (1 Jn 1:1). The mission of the servants of the Word – bishops, priests, religious and laity – is to allow everyone, without exception, to enter into a personal relationship with Christ. In the full range of the Church’s missionary activity, all the faithful are called to live their baptismal commitment to the fullest, in accordance with the personal situation of each. A generous response to this universal vocation can be offered by consecrated men and women through an intense life of prayer and union with the Lord and his redeeming sacrifice.

To Mary, Mother of the Church and model of missionary outreach, I entrust all men and women who, in every state of life work to proclaim the Gospel, ad gentes or in their own lands. To all missionaries of the Gospel I willingly impart my Apostolic Blessing.

II. EXPLANATORY NOTES ON TELUGU TRANSLATION OF THE MISSALE ROMANUM, EDITIO TYPICA TERTIA AND CORRECTION OF WORDS IN TELUGU TRANSLATION

The Roman Missal published in Latin in the year 2002, is made available in Telugu from 2012 for use in Andhra Pradesh and Telangana States. It is accurately translated from the original text in Latin according to the norms laid down by the **Liturgiam Authenticam**, which urges a strong adherence to Latin wording and structure, while paying attention to the rich Scriptural and theological underpinnings as well as to pastoral concerns and proclaimability of the text. Hence, our new Telugu translation followed the sequence of the Latin orations retaining the distinctive theological emphasis of the original texts. It is duly approved by the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments of the Holy See. Thanks to the hard work of TCBC. The Bishops incharge were closely involved in personally checking the final texts and taking active part in the various stages of the preparation.

In this context, the TCBC Commission for Liturgy, gone through the suggestions by the faithful, clergy, consecrated and bishops and the commission is making the following observations and clarifications on certain noticeable changes in this New Telugu Roman Missal.

I. Style of the Language

The style of the languages in the legal documents is different from the style followed in the dissertation papers. A story style in a children’s book differs from the text message in a mobile phone. Similarly, Liturgy has its own decorum, identity, literary genre and in short, nobility of the language in the use of expression and words. The prayers in Latin have certain rhythm, flow and sentiment. A good translation, therefore, requires the correct words to express the same feeling as is found in the original text. Accordingly, one would easily notice that the new translation is richer in style, in content and Scriptural

allusions. Further, the Liturgical texts, which are Sacred by nature, do demand **fidelity and exactness** in rendering the translation into a vernacular language. It means that across the world, though the language and local customs may be different, the form of the Mass and the content of the prayers is the same. Thus the Missal is a sign of unity. Therefore, an utmost care has been taken in this regard.

A) Consequently, addressing God in 2nd person singular, just like in the original text in Latin, is faithfully maintained and reintroduced. Note that it is in no way a deviation or degradation of God, but an expression of affection for and intimacy with God, who is a loving Father to each one of us.

Simultaneously, by this manner of addressing, the uniqueness of God as the one and the only God is safeguarded. The same is evident from the previous accurate translation (cf. the translation of Telugu Missal in 1969, headed by the Archbishop Most Rev. Gopu Mark of Hyderabad, reprinted in 1977 by the APBC, which has the same expression in 2nd person singular. Imprimatur: Most Rev. Gopu Ignatious, Bishop of Visakhapatnam). Besides, the Biblical tradition (eg. Psalms) and the Catholic Liturgical tradition “Laudamus te” and “Et cum spiritu tuo”. Te Deum Laudamus) have always addressed God in this personal and intimate way. The same is true in other religions in India.

However in this transition period, some may have difficulty in appreciating the beauty of this intimacy, nonetheless, they will eventually find their way to relish it to the full. We need to give a chance and sufficient time for entering into its depth. A bit of Catechesis is not out of place when and where it is needed.

2. Changes in the Order of Mass

B) The revised Order of Mass contains only a few modifications of the previous text although some of them are of major nature. We have carefully dealt with them. Several linguistic problems were attended in and errors and ambiguities were eliminated through the accurate translation of the original text in Latin(cf. the Order of Mass card with people’s responses).

2.1. Let us start with the greeting : Dominus Vobiscum- Et cum spiritu tuo. This is specifically a liturgical greeting, essentially different from the secular greetings like, “Hello”, or “Good morning”. This liturgical greeting is inviting us into the presence of God, reminding us that we are entering into a sacramental realm where we experience the mystery of faith. Hence the celebrant should make sure that its spiritual and sacramental meaning is properly expressed in greeting the people with a pure heart. However, many are criticizing this modification “ Et cum spiritu tuo” and with your spirit= “nee athmathonu undurugaaka”. Here there is not much space for a full discussion of the matter except to state that it is an age old expression found both in the Eastern and Western liturgies from the earliest days of the Church. It is borrowed from the Biblical tradition: Ruth 2:4; 2 Tim. 4:22; Gal. 6:18; Phil. 4:25; Philm. 5:25). This expression brings us back to the early centuries with their deep appreciation of the priests as being in a special way “men of the Spirit” in their service. St. John Chrysostom, as one of the many Fathers of the Church, identifies this with the “indwelling Holy Spirit”. Thus the Christ’s faithful identify each priest, as the anointed one by the Spirit of God and led by His Holy Spirit.

2.2. In the penitential rite, ambiguous expressions in Telugu are replaced with more significant ones to unearth the penitential spirit : **Thonu** with **Chenthanu**, **paapasankeerthanamu** with **paapamulanu oppukonuchunnanu**, **lopamu** with ashradha. Now any misunderstanding about the sense of sin is rectified and is made clear in the new translation adhering to the original text. The new translation for the “Sacrament of Penance” is no more paapavimochana samskaramu. The expression paapasankeerthanamu is out of place in the context of the penitential rite because this is not a prayer for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Rather it is a petition for pardon.

2.3. It is no more **“pray, brethren, that our sacrifice is acceptable...”** but **“that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable...”** At first sight, it might seem that a separation is related between the priest and the people in the celebration. But this **“my and yours”** distinction is made to remind and emphasis that all of us have to bring something into Christ’s sacrifice: the farmer as a farmer, the teacher as a teacher, the nurse as a nurse, the seminarian as a seminarian, the parent as a parent, the school-child as a school child etc., Thus in the sacrifice of Christ all the activities of human life are to be brought back to the Father. No priest or even Bishop can do it for others. Each individual has to actively offer oneself in the Sacrifice of Christ. We have a serious duty here to Catechize our people in this regard and teach the Christ’s faithful to offer themselves in the Eucharistic celebration.

2.4. There is a change in the introductory Dialogue of the Preface. “It is right to give thanks and praise” is changed into **“It is right and just, our duty and our salvation to give you thanks ...”** Hence the change in Telugu: **Ninnu stuthinchuta yujkthamu, nyaayamu, dharmamu, rakshanadayakamu.**

3. Eucharistic Prayer

In the words of consecration of the wine, attention must be paid to the following: The present translation in Telugu is:

Meeru deenini teesikoni Deeninundi (exeo) Paanamu cheyudu..... Idi mee korakunu anakula korakunu (pro multis) dhaaravoyabadunu.

Let us take up the **pro multis (for many)**, instead of **for all**. Here the difficulty lies in explaining the **“anakula Korakunu”** to the people who are so far used to saying or listening: **“andari korakunu”**. There are at least **two** important reasons for this change: First of all, the Church likes in this important part of the Liturgy to be as close as possible to the Biblical original. (Mt 26:28; Mk. 24:14). There are also ecumenical considerations here because most of the other churches, if not all, have retained biblical wording in the Eucharistic Prayer. The most helpful consideration is the second reason i. e., the expression “for many”, while remaining open to the inclusion of each person, is reflective also of the fact that this salvation is not brought about in some mechanical way. In spite of the fact that Christ died for all does not mean that automatically everyone will go to heaven. Christ never answered the question: “How many would be saved?” The parable of the sower where some of the seed is lost may bring out the same point. So while absolutely there is no doubt that Christ did die for all, each one must make sure for his or for her own part, not to be lost. In this way, this change is not a mere reminder but a great challenge

to all of us to work more earnestly for our own salvation by fully cooperating with Christ, the Saviour and to pray for the conversion of the sinners so that fruits of Christ's salvific supreme sacrifice may not be lost by any one. Kindly note that the present **dhaaravoyabadunu** is quite an accurate rendering of the **effundetur** in Latin.

4. Printing Errors : However, allow me to point out the **printing error** in the **words of the consecration**. At the consecration of the bread, it is printed as :

Deenini theesikoni Bhujimpmu.

Instead, **it should be read as:**

..... .. Bhujimpdu.

Because the subject is in plural, the verb should end in plural form. The plural form ends with **du** and not **mu**.

The same is to be noted at the consecration of the wine:

Now it is wrongly printed with **mu** as:

Deenini theesikoni, Deeninudi

Paanamu cheymu

Naa gnapakaardhamu cheymu

Instead **it should be read as:**

Deenini theesikoni deeninudi

Paanamucheydu

Naa Gnapakaardhamu cheydu.

The same error has entered in the Preface Dialogue, please change:

Mee manassulanu prabhuvu vaipunaku thrippmu

to: thrippdu.

5. Some other parameters

I appreciate your kind attention in this regard.

For the rest, a lot of things i.e., the new translation of the Presidential prayers and Prefaces, including the Eucharistic Prayers, as well as the Antiphons and other chants etc., can be very well understood with an attentive reading of the material. The new translation calls for a careful and thoughtful attention to pauses while proclaiming them, thus fostering a less hurried and more reverent way of praying them.

There is no doubt that the theological accuracy and enrichment of correct expressions in this new Telugu translation is a cause of great satisfaction for us. It does put a new responsibility on the celebrant to meditate on the texts, and both read and explain them in a way the people can spiritually profit.

We hope that the introduction of the new Telugu Missal offers us two golden opportunities::

- to relearn our own way of celebrating the Eucharist;
- to make every effort to catechize our people on the Liturgical matters.

CONCLUSION

For us the challenge is to **look at the whole thing positively** and as a marvelous opportunity for us to revisit the Roman Liturgy and to recognize its great history. The purpose of the Eucharist is not only to adore Jesus Christ under the signs of the bread and wine or to receive Jesus Christ in our heart but **to announce the death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ and the forgiveness of sins**. Eucharist is first is a necessity for us all who experience every day that we are sinners, and secondly the need for us to go back to calvary and the empty tomb to receive a new life in the Risen Lord Jesus through the ministry of the Church.

Already in all the dioceses of Telangana and Andhra Pradesh, the New Telugu Roman Missal is introduced. At the diocesan Recollections Liturgical catechisis was promoted. I thank all the priests who Catechise the faithful began using this new Telugu Roman Missal in their parishes.

A good preparation for Mass by giving through the text would facilitate the celebration clearly meaningful and prayerful. Please use the revised Missal book in English and Telugu and Celebrate the Mass Meaningfully and devoutly. Any other errors you observe, kindly bring them to my attention. Anyone who does not use the new missal is liable for accountability.



The New of Bishop of Adilabad

Father Antony Prince Panengadan was appointed the bishop of the Adilabad Diocese the appointment was announced by Pope Francis on August 6 at the Vatican and simultaneously by the Major Archbishop George Cardinal Alencherry at the Major Archiepiscopal Curia, Mount St. Thomas, at the Bishop's House, Adilabad. Bishop Joseph Kunnath presented the newly appointed Bishop with the sash, Pectoral Cross and the ring. Bishop Panengadan was born on May, 13, 1976, at St. Antony's Parish, Arimpoor in the Archeparchy of Trichur-Kerala. Having done his initial seminary formation in the CMI Congregation, he joined the mission eparchy of Adilabad. He had his philosophical and theological formation at Dharmaram Vidya Kshetram, Bangalore and Ruhalya Seminary, Ujjain.



He was ordained as a priest on April, 25, 2007, having served at the Adilabad Cathedral Church as assistant parish priest and at Saligaon Parish as its priest. The date of submission of Offline Applications under the Pre-Matric Scholarship scheme for of minority students has been extended to 15th October, 2015 from 31st August, 2015. The Ministry of Minority Affairs has decided to relax the guidelines of the scheme in view of the technical glitches being faced by the students while applying on the National Scholarship Portal (NSP) for the Ministry's Pre-Matric scholarship scheme. Dr.Najma Heptulla, the Union Minister for Minority Affairs said that the extension will be applicable in respect of fresh applications and the benefit will be extended to all the States/ Union Territories. She informed that the Ministry will issue necessary orders soon in this regard.

The Ministry had received representations from several quarters regarding the difficulty faced by the students in remote parts of the country in filling application online. Reviewing representations, the Minister took a considerate view on the issue and agreed to permit the students of Class I to VIII to apply offline under the Pre-Matric Scholarship scheme.

Earlier this month in view of larger interest of the minority students the Ministry has extended the date of submission of applications for the Maulana Azad National Fellowship. The Ministry also permitted one time chance for minority students with rejected claims of 2014- 15 to edit and correct their bank details. Edit facility is available on National Scholarship Portal (NSP) till 30th September, 2015.




