




## Values and Beliefs of Europe *Spirituality Vs Religiosity*

The world has been changing at a high speed especially in Europe, where I am currently going through. After four years, especially in post-Covid times, I could notice a sea of change in most aspects of life especially regarding the practice of faith. 'Happiness is the pursuit of life', as it appears to me. There are very many ways to increase one's happiness, short or long-term happiness. One of the top ways that stands out is the practice one's religion. When describing their faith I heard people say that they are "spiritual but not religious". A majority of the people use the words "religion" and "spirituality" interchangeably, but they are entirely separate concepts.



### Understanding of Religion

Religion commonly refers to an institution that has a set of organized practices and a structured belief system shared by and among those who are members of the institution. Their beliefs, which are often transcendental, are passed on from members to converts, and are based on either a formally documented creed or established cultural practices. In either case, there are professionals within each religion who act in positions of leadership and who represent formal aspects of the institution. The leaders often carry out certain rituals regarding the core beliefs of the religion, which lay the foundation for how one's life should be lived.

As a community or group sharing the same beliefs, religion functions strongly supportive. It creates practical implications for everyday behaviors in adherence to the beliefs, rituals, and practices of the group. Members of a religion often also follow distinctive dress codes, moral codes, and actions that are mandated by a supernatural being. He or she observes the rites and practices, such as regularly attending church services on a Sunday for Christians, the Sabbath for Jews, and Friday prayers for Muslims. Religion commonly refers to an institution that has a set of organized practices and a structured belief system shared by and among those who are members of the institution.

### Understanding of Spirituality

Spirituality is about one's soul and inner self. Being spiritual involves holding one's personal set of beliefs and practices and searching for the purpose of life. Each person's own definition of spirituality can vary adapting to individual experiences through personal study and self-reflection. The goal of spirituality is to realize one's inherent power to combat all of life's challenges, and connect with something greater than oneself. Spirituality is a universal, personalized experience, and everyone's experience is unique. One may describe a spiritual experience as being sacred or transcendent, or plainly a true sense of liveliness and feeling interconnected. One can belong to a religious group and still be spiritual, and vice versa. In fact, some may find that their spirituality is closely linked to a religion, while others may have their own personal relationship with a higher power. Some others seek the meaning of life through their connections to nature or art. Thus, today humanists and even atheists seem to increase!

## **Reflections on the Differences between Religion and Spirituality**

In seeking the divine whether from a church pew on a Sunday or on top of a ridge looking at a glorious sunrise, we increase our feelings of happiness, peace, and appreciation for the life that we have. Religion and spirituality are neither the same thing nor completely separate from one another. In spirituality, one may ponder, “Where do I find meaning in life, and what are my true values?” Meanwhile, in religion, common questions might be “What is the truth?” and “What is right and wrong?” Where the two overlap is each person’s individual experiences that affect how they think, feel, and act. Spirituality involves a personal quest for meaning in life, while religion involves an organized entity with rituals and practices focusing on a higher power or God.

### **Religious Pluralism**

When it comes to the religion vs. spirituality debate, neither is inherently good or bad. Spirituality is broader and more abstract than religion. Religion maintains a defined, tangible code of ethics, while spirituality is largely undefinable. However, both of these methods of believing in something help people live happy, meaningful lives. Religious pluralism is an attitude or policy regarding the diversity of religious belief system co-existing in society. Today’s culture recognizes and tolerates the religious diversity of the society by promoting freedom of religion, and defining secularism as neutrality of the state on issues of religion and promoting friendly separation of religion and state as opposed to hostile separation or antitheism espoused by other forms of secularism.

### **Religious Inclusivism and Ecumenism**

Religious inclusivism is the European-view holds that one’s own religion is not the sole and exclusive source of truth, and thus acknowledges that at least some truths and true values exist in other religions. Another concept is that two or more religions with mutually exclusive truth claims are equally valid; this may be considered a form of either toleration, a concept that arose as a result of the European wars of religion or moral relativism. Sometimes as a synonym for ecumenism, i.e., the promotion of some level of unity, co-operation, and improved understanding between different religions or different denominations within a single religion. These attitudes promote harmonious co-existence between adherents of different religions or religious denominations with religious diversity. People, in general want to live in harmony and mutual respect and thereby the practice of religion even among Catholics is very low!

### **Noticeable Beliefs Europeans Share**

1. Commitment to fundamental democratic principles, despite serious economic challenges in recent years, some of the highest living standards in the world.
2. Individualism and free expression regarding religion and morality on the increase.
3. Strong belief that they control their own destiny allowing everyone to pursue their life’s goals without interference from the state or others, even parents.
4. There is greater tolerance for offensive speech and this kind of speech should be legal.
5. Religion with spirituality is significantly important along with a wealthy nation.
6. On questions about morality, especially on issues related to sexuality is individual choice.


## II. Holy Father's Intention for July: for a Eucharistic Life

## III. Pope's Message for World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly

**“Honour Grandparents: Let us honour them, neither depriving ourselves of their company nor depriving them of ours. May we never allow the elderly to be cast aside!”**

With a call to honour and never abandon grandparents, Pope Francis issues Message for 3rd World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly on 23 July. The 86-year-old Pope instituted the Day in 2021, to be held the fourth Sunday in July, close to the feast of Jesus' grandparents, Saints Joachim and Anne. Pope Francis instituted this Day in 2021 since, he believes, grandparents are often forgotten, yet they “are the link between generations, passing on the experience of life and faith to the young.”



### **“His Mercy is from age to age”**

Pope Francis chose as this year's theme “His mercy is from age to age” (Lk 1:50), which he recalled, takes us back to the joyful meeting between the young Mary and her elderly relative Elizabeth (Lk 1:39-56). The Holy Spirit had descended upon Elizabeth, and had earlier, descended upon Mary, prompting her to respond with the Magnificat, in which she proclaimed that the Lord's mercy is from generation to generation.

That same Spirit, the Pope observes in the Message, “blesses and accompanies every fruitful encounter between different generations: between grandparents and grandchildren, between young and old.”

### **Bring joy to the elderly's Hearts**

The Pope expressed the delight that young people can offer older generations. “God wants young people to bring joy to the hearts of the elderly, as Mary did to Elizabeth, and gain wisdom from their experiences. Yet, above all, the Lord wants us not to abandon the elderly...” The Pope lamented how often they tragically are pushed aside. This year, the World Day, the Pope recalled, takes place close to World Youth Day, stressing how maintaining quality connections with the older generations has priceless value for the young. “The Lord,” the Pope suggested, “trusts that young people, through their relationships with the elderly, will realize that they are called to cultivate memory and recognize the beauty of being part of a much larger history.”

### **Become friends**

Friendship with an older person, he said, can help the young “to see life not only in terms of the present and realize that not everything depends on them and their abilities.” For the elderly, on the other hand, he noted, the presence of a young person in their lives “can give them hope that their experience will not be lost and that their dreams can find fulfillment.” God’s loving plan, the Pope expressed, spans past, present and future. “It embraces and connects the generations.” “It is greater than we are, yet includes each of us and calls us at every moment to keep pressing forward.” For the young, the Holy Father said, “this means being ready to break free from the fleeting present in which virtual reality can entrap us, preventing us from doing something productive.” For the elderly, he continued, “it means not dwelling on the loss of physical strength and thinking with regret about missed opportunities.”

### **Do not abandon them**

In the meeting between Mary and Elizabeth, the Pope said, God points us toward the future that He is opening up before us. The Holy Father encouraged everyone to reflect on that meeting, “to picture, like a snapshot, that embrace between the young Mother of God and the elderly mother of Saint John the Baptist, and to frame it in their minds and hearts as a radiant icon.”

### **“Let us not abandon them.”**

“Their presence in families and communities,” the Pope highlighted, “is a precious one, for it reminds us that we share the same heritage and are part of a people committed to preserving its roots.”

### **Church and society need Elderly’s gifts**

“From the elderly we received the gift of belonging to God’s holy people. The Church, as well as society, needs them, for they entrust to the present the past that is needed to build the future. The World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly, the Holy Father said, is meant “to be a small but precious sign of hope for them and for the whole Church.”

The Holy Father renewed his invitation to everyone, and in a special way, dioceses, parishes, associations and communities, to celebrate this Day and to make it “the occasion of a joyful and renewed encounter between young and old.” To the young who are preparing to meet in Lisbon or to celebrate World Youth Day in their own countries, the Pope asked that before they set out on their journey, that they visit their grandparents or an elderly person who lives alone.

### **Great affection for elderly**

The Holy Father also asked the elderly to accompany the young people about to celebrate World Youth Day with their prayers. “Those young people are God’s answer to your prayers, the fruits of all that you have sown, the sign that God does not abandon His people, but always rejuvenates them with the creativity of the Holy Spirit.”

Before giving his blessing with “great affection,” Pope Francis concluded by addressing grandparents and the elderly, praying that “the blessing of the embrace between Mary and Elizabeth come upon you and fill your hearts with peace.”

Your Eminence,

The Holy Father has chosen as the theme for the *Third World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly*, which will be celebrated this year on Sunday, July 23, the verse from the Gospel of Luke "**His mercy is from age to age**" (*Lk 1:50*), to emphasize the link between this celebration and the World Youth Day that will take place a few days later in Lisbon (August 1 - 6, 2023).

Dialogue between generations is, in fact, a valuable resource for every Christian community, which can thus recognize itself as the People of God and understand how the Lord's mercy is faithfully manifested throughout history.

In view of how close the World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly is to the World Youth Day, we suggest that young people, who will be leaving for Lisbon, and those who will experience it with local initiatives, fulfill a gesture of solidarity and friendship toward the elderly in their community.

With this in mind, the Dicastery for Laity, Family and Life will provide the particular Churches with some pastoral tools that we will send to you and that will be published on the Dicastery's website. As usual, we suggest that at the heart of the Day there should be a Eucharistic celebration together with the grandparents and the elderly of the community and a visit to those living in solitary conditions.

A message from the Holy Father is scheduled to be published as well.

In the hope that celebrating the Day will represent an opportunity to convey to grandparents and the elderly the closeness of the Church, I send you my cordial greetings in Christ.

## V. Solemnity of St. Thomas, Apostle of India- July 3

### “Indian Christian Day” an Ecumenical Venture

St. Thomas, the apostle who at first did not believe, has become for the Church one of the first witnesses to her faith. She is fond of appealing to his testimony and frequently puts in our mouths those simple words whereby he expressed the fervour of his regained faith: “My Lord and my God.” It is known that St. Thomas preached the Gospel in Asia beyond the frontiers of the Roman Empire, probably in Persia and possibly as far afield as India. St. Thomas’ feast was formerly celebrated on December 21.



There is very little about the apostle Thomas in the Gospels; one text calls him the “twin.” Rarely during Jesus’ lifetime does he stand out among his colleagues. There is the instance before the raising of Lazarus, when Jesus was still in Perea and Thomas exclaimed: “Let us also go and die with Him.” Best-known is his expression of unbelief after the Savior’s death, giving rise to the phrase “doubting Thomas.” Nevertheless, the passage describing the incident, had as today’s Gospel, must be numbered among the most touching in Sacred Scripture.

In the Breviary lessons Pope St. Gregory the Great makes the following reflections: “Thomas’ unbelief has benefited our faith more than the belief of the other disciples; it is because he attained faith through physical touch that we are confirmed in the faith beyond all doubt. Indeed, the Lord permitted the apostle to doubt after the resurrection; but He did not abandon him in doubt. By his doubt and by his touching the sacred wounds the apostle became a witness to the truth of the resurrection. Thomas touched and cried out: My Lord and my God! And Jesus said to him: Because you have seen Me, Thomas, you have believed. Now if Thomas saw and touched the Savior, why did Jesus say: Because you have seen Me, Thomas, you have believed? Because he saw something other than what he believed. For no mortal man can see divinity. Thomas saw the Man Christ and acknowledged His divinity with the words: My Lord and my God. Faith therefore followed upon seeing.”

Concerning later events in the apostle’s life very meager information exists. The Martyrology has this: “At Calamina (near Madras in India) the martyrdom of the apostle Thomas—he announced the Gospel to the Parthians, and finally came to India. After he had converted numerous tribes to Christianity, he was pierced with lances at the king’s command.”

## VI. Feast of St. Mary Magdalene- July 22

The feast of St. Mary Magdalene is considered one of the most mystical of feasts, and it is said that of all the songs of the saints, that of Mary Magdalene is the sweetest and strongest because her love was so great. That love was praised by Jesus Himself who said that because much was forgiven her, she loved much. Where she is buried, no one knows. Legend has her dying in Provence, France, in a cavern where she spent her last days, and her body resting in the chapel of St. Maximin in the Maritime Alps. Another has her buried in Ephesus where she went with St. John after the Resurrection. This latter view is more likely, and St. Willibald, the English pilgrim to the Holy Land in the eighth century, was shown her tomb there. She was the first recorded witness to the resurrection of Jesus, His most ardent and loving follower. She had stood with Mary at the foot of the Cross on that brutal Good Friday afternoon and had been by the side of Mary during these difficult hours. On Easter morning, she went with the other women to the tomb and it was there, in the garden near the tomb, that Jesus appeared to her. It was she who brought the news of the Resurrection to the Apostles, and Peter and John raced to the tomb to see what had happened. She was from Magadala, a small fishing town on the Sea of Galilee, between Capernaum and Tiberias. She was known to be a “great sinner,” a woman of the streets who heard Jesus speak of the mercy and forgiveness of God and changed her life completely. Her matter-of-fact witness to the Resurrection moved Peter and John to go and see for themselves: “I have seen the Lord and these things he said to me.” Jesus had chosen her to bring the news to them and she simply told them what had happened. She has always been the example of great love and great forgiveness, one of those close to Jesus who grasped the truth of God’s love for human beings and spent her life bearing witness to that love.



## VII. World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly- July 23


Pope Francis established the World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly in 2021. The day takes place annually on the fourth Sunday of July, on or close to the July 26 Feast of Sts. Anne and Joachim, the grandparents of Jesus. This year, it will be celebrated on July 23. The Vatican unveiled in February the theme for the third celebration of the day, “Honour Grandparents: Let us honour them, neither depriving ourselves of their company nor depriving them of ours. May we never allow the elderly to be cast aside!” The theme chosen by the Holy Father for the occasion “intends to emphasize how grandparents and the



elderly are a value and a gift both for society and for ecclesial communities”. The day is an invitation to reconsider and value grandparents and the elderly who are too often kept on the margins of families, civil and ecclesial communities. Their experience of life and faith can contribute, in fact, to building societies that are aware of their roots and capable of dreaming of a future based on greater solidarity”, continues the statement, adding that “the invitation to listen to the wisdom of the years is also particularly significant in the context of the synodal journey that the Church has undertaken.” Finally, the statement concludes stressing that the Dicastery for Laity, Family and Life “invites parishes, dioceses, associations and ecclesial communities throughout the world to find ways to celebrate the Day in their own pastoral context, and for this purpose, it will later make available some appropriate pastoral tools.”

### **VIII. Feast of St. James, the Apostle-July 25**

St. James, known as the Greater, in order to distinguish him from the other Apostle St. James, our Lord’s cousin, was St. John’s brother. With Peter and John he was one of the witnesses of the Transfiguration, as later he was also of the agony in the garden. He was beheaded in Jerusalem in 42 or 43 on the orders of Herod Agrippa. St. James the Greater and his brother John were apparently partners with those other two brothers, Peter and Andrew, and lived in Bethsaida, on the north shore of the Sea of Galilee. How and where James first met Jesus, we do not know; but there is an old legend that makes Salome, his mother, a sister of Mary, and if this were the case, he would have known Jesus from childhood. His prominence and his presence in Jerusalem must have been well known, for scarcely a dozen years after the Resurrection, he became involved in the political maneuverings of the day and was arrested and executed by King Herod Agrippa. This was followed by the arrest of Peter also, so his death must have been part of a purge of Christian leaders by Agrippa, who saw the new Christian movement as a threat to Judaism. James’s death is the only biblical record we have of the death of one of the Apostles, and he was the first of that chosen band to give his life for his Master.



### **IX. Feast of Sts. Joachim and Anne – July 26**

#### **Feast Day wishes to all St. Ann’s Congregations/ Convents**

It was in the home of Joachim and Ann where the Virgin Mary received her training to be the Mother of God. Thus, devotion to Ann and Joachim is an extension of the affection Christians have always professed toward our Blessed Mother. We, too, owe a debt of gratitude to our parents for their help in our Christian formation. Our information about Mary’s parents comes

from an apocryphal Christian writing, the Protoevangelium Jacobi (or Gospel of James), written about the year 170. According to this story, Joachim was a prominent and respected man who had no children, and he and his wife, Anne, looked upon this as a punishment from God. In answer to their prayers, Mary was born and was dedicated to God at a very early age. We know little else about the lives of Mary's parents, but considering the person of Mary, they must have been two very remarkable people to have been given such a daughter and to have played so important a part in the work of the Redemption. There is a church of St. Anne in Jerusalem and it is believed to be built on the site of the home of SS. Joachim and Anne, when they lived in Jerusalem.



### X. St. Alphonsa- July 28

Saint Alphonsa lived a saintly life and was recognized as a saintly person during her lifetime. Even at a young age she showed a great zeal for suffering and she used to pray fervently and longed for sacrifice and fasting as and when possible. She believed that she must endure all things that tests her will and offer them to the Lord. It is said that in spite of her painful diseases, she was cheerful to the last. It was her students who established the cult of Saint Alphonsa. After her death, they began visiting her tomb and offering prayers. As they continued, they started receiving favours. Ever since, her tomb has been a centre of pilgrimage and



innumerable miracles. The first officially confirmed miracle was that of, a disabled child miraculously cured of his ailment and his limbs restored, due to prayers at the altar of Sister Alphonsa's shrine. The miracle was approved in 1985 and the beatification of Sister Alphonsa was proclaimed by Pope John Paul II, during his visit to India in 1986. There is a two floored structure in front of the shrine which was originally the Papal podium for the beatification ceremony on 8 Feb.1986. Sister Alphonsa became Saint Alphonsa after she was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI at a ceremony at St. Peter's Square, Vatican on 12 October 2008. The Clarist convent where Sr. Alphonsa lived is located near St. Mary's Syro-Malabar Catholic Forane Church in Bharananganam. There is a museum adjacent to the convent chapel where the personal belongings of the Saint are well preserved. The feast is celebrated on the death anniversary of the saint which falls on 28th July. It was on this day in 1946 that Alphonsa flew off on the wings of grace to be in the beatific presence of her Maker.

## XI. Memorial of Saints Martha, Mary and Lazarus– July 29


In the household of Bethany the Lord Jesus experienced the family spirit and friendship of Martha, Mary and Lazarus, and for this reason the Gospel of John states that he loved them. Martha generously offered him hospitality, Mary listened attentively to his words and Lazarus promptly emerged from the tomb at the command of the One who humiliated death. The traditional uncertainty of the Latin Church about the identity of Mary—the Magdalene to whom Christ appeared after his resurrection, the sister of Martha, the sinner whose sins the Lord had forgiven—which resulted in the inclusion of Martha alone on 29 July in the Roman Calendar, has been resolved in recent studies and times, as attested by the current Roman Martyrology, which also commemorates Mary and Lazarus on that day. Moreover, in some particular calendars the three siblings are already celebrated together.



Therefore, the Supreme Pontiff Pope Francis, considering the important evangelical witness they offered in welcoming the Lord Jesus into their home, in listening to him attentively, in believing that he is the resurrection and the life, and accepting the proposal of this Dicastery, has decreed that 29 July be designated in the General Roman Calendar as the Memorial of Saints Martha, Mary and Lazarus. This feast is celebrated today both in the Ordinary Form and Extraordinary Form of the Roman Rite.


## XII. Feast of Ignatius of Loyola - July 31

**Feast Day Wishes to All Jesuits** St. Ignatius Loyola was born in 1491, one of 13 children of a family of minor nobility in northern Spain. As a young man Ignatius Loyola was inflamed by the ideals of courtly love and knighthood and dreamed of doing great deeds. But in 1521 Ignatius was gravely wounded in a battle with the French. While recuperating, Ignatius Loyola experienced a conversion. Reading the lives of Jesus and the saints made Ignatius happy and aroused desires to do great things. Ignatius realized that these feelings were clues to God's direction for him. Over the years, Ignatius became expert in the art of spiritual direction. He collected his insights, prayers, and suggestions in his book the *Spiritual Exercises*, one of the most influential books on the spiritual life ever written. With a small group of friends, Ignatius Loyola founded the Society of Jesus, or the Jesuits. Ignatius conceived the Jesuits as “contemplatives in action.” This also describes the many Christians who have been touched by Ignatian spirituality.

### **5. NEWS FROM LODI: GIVE YOUR HANDS TO SERVE AND YOUR HEARTS TO LOVE." ...Saint Mother Theresa**

We extend our heart-felt thanks to Rev. Fr. D. Vijaya Paul who was so much committed and enthusiastic in his services as the Director of LODI MSSS for eight years, from May, 2015 to May, 2023.

**I. Title of the Project:** Sustainable Livelihood Based Food Security program for the Marginalized Communities of 20 villages of Raikal Mandal, Jagityal district

#### **Activities done:**

- We have completed renovation of four feeder channels in Vastapur, Lokynaik Thanda, Oddelingapur & Aloor villages.
- We have completed renovation of 3 existing irrigation ponds in Aloor, Ayodya & Veerapur villages.

**II. Title of the Project:** Poverty Reduction among Poor and Marginalised rural households with Livelihoods, Ecological farming and Natural Resource Management in Kodakandla mandal

**Activities done:**

- Constructed 1 weir on a small pond in 1 project village to increase storage capacity and 30 farmers will be benefited with enhanced irrigation from bore wells and wells.
- 4220 tractor trips of tank silt from 2 irrigation tanks in 2 project villages was applied in 210 acres of agriculture land of 105 small and marginal farmers with a desiltation program.

**III. Revolving Fund Loans:**

- During the month of June, 2023, 370 beneficiaries (Women & Farmers) of 10 villages were supported with the loan of Rs. 84,80,000/-.
- 2589 members of Fatima Mahila Sahakara Sangam of 65 villages were supported with the loan of Rs. 87,20,000/-.

**IV. Child Line, Warangal**

- During the month of May 2023, totally 13 children were saved by Child Line staff of LODI: 4 children from child marriages: 2 from human trafficking: 2 children who ran away from their homes; 2 from emotional abuse and 2 children were joined in the school.
- On 16/6/2023 Nutrition support was provided to 150 HIV-infected children.
- 225 children of HIV-infected or affected families were provided with notebooks, school & college bags and stationery.
- Two bicycles were purchased for two children.
