

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
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

Asian Continental Outstanding Features on Synodality**

The following is my reflections of just concluded Asian Continental Assembly (24-27 Feb. 2023) at Bangkok, Thailand, in which I participated on behalf of all the Priests in the Asian Continent. The final document would be submitted to the Holy father as from all Continents!



Asian Ethos-Character

The cultural and Biblical image of the synodal continental assembly of Asia is to “**Take off Your Shoes**” (Ex. 3:5). The burning Bush experience of Moses was burning all through the life of Moses. The continent of Asia is like the Burning bush that attracts our attention and makes us fall humble in front of its Burning issues. Though the synodal journey is not something altogether new to the Churches in Asia, for the Latin Church it is somewhat new! Asia is the largest and most populated continent and is blessed with diverse cultures, philosophies, religions, languages, ideologies, geographies, and ethnicities. While Christianity remains a very small minority in most parts of Asia (around 6.53%), the vibrancy and richness of the individual cultures bring joy to the life of the Church. Though the systems of beliefs, values, and symbols vary from place to place, the interconnectedness of the human community draws the Asian peoples together. The Asian value of being spiritual and relational with God, self, neighbour, Environment and even the cosmos brings with it the unity of the human family and the unity with the Environment cum the Universe!

Unity in Diversity with Challenges

Despite the benefits that unity and diversity bring to Asia, it is also entrenched with many challenges that directly affect the Church and the lives of the people of Asia. Some of the challenges are the widespread poverty across Asia, the ecological threat that has brought disequilibrium in the lives of people, the challenges of systemic corruption, the waves of economic migration in search of better lives, the political instability that causes internal disruption to peace and harmony, Oppressive governments, Religious fundamentalism and much more. All of these have a direct impact on the Church as she seeks to reach out to all peoples holding high their human dignity and freedom.

Pope’s Call for Synodality

The call of Pope Francis to the universal Church to a process of synodality through a process of walking together with mutual listening has been generally received positively despite reservations from some quarters in the Church. There is a sense of gratitude and feeling privileged for the opportunity to take part in the renewal and revitalizing of the universal and local Church. This is indeed an expression of the universal Church and the local Churches walking together as one. The positive effects of bringing people from all walks of life, both within and outside the Church into a process of praying with one another, listening to one

another, and discerning the voice of the Holy Spirit bring forth in them a new experience of vitality and dynamism to the life of the Church. In spite of the challenges, the synodal journey has been considered a moment of grace and healing for the Church.

Image of the Church as Tent

“Enlarge the place of your tent (IS 54:2) is the image of the ‘Church’, which projects her to be a place of refuge that can be expanded to all in a spirit of inclusivity. It also expresses that God can pitch his tent wherever the Spirit of God blows, including in places where there is violence, unrest, and suffering. Most importantly, in the tent, there is room for everyone, with no one being excluded because it is a home to everyone. In this process, those who in the past felt “left out” now realized that they have a home in this tent - a sacred and safe space. Most of the responses responded positively to the image of the tent. The image of the tent also reminds us that Jesus pitched his tent among us through the incarnation and therefore the tent also is a place of encounter with God and one another. The tent, now seen as the common home, also has rekindled a sense of belonging and sharing in the common baptism. The synodal process has brought about a greater awareness of the importance of walking together in the Church as a communion of communities for the organic growth of the Church.

Varied Consultations and Responses


The continental consultation in the respective dioceses and countries took varied forms. Some countries were able to involve many people from different walks of life while others were only able to gather smaller groups of people. The challenges of time and language became an obstacle for some countries. Nevertheless, those who took part in this process of reflecting contributed constructively in a spirit of prayer and discernment for the betterment of the Church. The involvement of such a vast number of people in the synodal process has revealed a profound love for the Church despite the shortcomings and weaknesses of the Church as an institution. In reflecting, it was felt that the given short period of time prevented the possibility of having an more deliberation and consultation. The inability to translate the Document into the vernacular languages was another limitation experienced by the Churches.

Great Hope for Renewal

The exercise at Diocesan and Regional and National levels reveals a sense of hope and joy for the Church to move forward because of the love of God for his people. We are convinced that the Holy Spirit neither stops nor fails in inspiring the people of God to move in the direction of personal, communal, and structural conversion. We also acknowledge that the process of having the synodal conversations as requested has sometimes been painful and unsettling, while at the same time, making us vulnerable to each other. The ongoing exercise of walking, listening and discerning captures the hopes, aspirations, desolations, and challenges of the people in a way that opens the door for a greater renewal in the life of the Church. In many places it was indeed experienced as a moment of living Synodality in the Church through a process of shared identity and shared responsibility.

Let us enlarge of personal, parish, diocesan, national and Continental Tent inviting all humanity as to be a Family of God!

on March 13, Pope Francis will be celebrating TEN years of his Pontificate.

The Pope of the Universe: Laudato Si

The Pope of walking and Listening together: Synod of Synodality

III. Francis: the Discerning Pope by Nicholas Austin SJ

13 March 2013 was the date of the historic election of the first Jesuit pope. Jorge Mario Bergoglio SJ took the name of Francis and in the five years since, he has captured headlines, imaginations and hearts worldwide. Nicholas Austin SJ looks at one of the foundation stones of Francis' papacy and, indeed, his life as a Jesuit: discernment. What, according to Pope Francis, does it mean to be a discerning Christian?



When Pope Francis was asked, in the famous interview published by Thinking Faith, 'What does it mean for a Jesuit to be elected Pope?' his reply was a single word: 'Discernment.' The value he places on this practice is evident from the way in which he continually returns to the theme in his addresses, homilies and writings. In this month of March, his prayer intention is, 'That the Church may appreciate the urgency of formation in spiritual discernment, both on the personal and communitarian levels.'² Francis's petition for the Church is that it becomes the discerning Church. What can we learn about discernment from this discerning pope? For Francis discernment is a dying followed by a rising: it is letting go of one's own plans, certainties and agendas, and allowing oneself to be guided into new life by the unpredictable leadings of the Holy Spirit. This essay will not look at communal or pastoral discernment, but focus on what it means for each individual Christian to be discerning. I will touch on three of Francis' insights into this simple but transformative practice, three reflections that can direct our prayer to become more fully attuned to the creative work of the Spirit in our prayer and in our lives.

Discernment as a new perspective

When Francis spoke to a group of newly ordained bishops, not too long after he was elected pope, he chose the topic of discernment. He offered the following invitation: I invite you to cultivate an attitude of listening, growing in the freedom of relinquishing one's own point of view (when it is shown to be partial and insufficient), to assume that of God. With disarming simplicity, the pope is saying something quite astonishing. He is saying that, through discernment, we can shed our prejudices and limited viewpoints, and take on a new perspective, God's perspective. We are to be drawn, Francis says, into 'a way of sensing the things of God from

within God's own heart.' Is this presumption, to imagine that we can understand how things look to God? 'For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts' (Isaiah 55:9). Yet we do not need to read these words from Isaiah as a prohibition against trying to understand God's thoughts. Rather, the prophet challenges us to step out of our own limited viewpoint, and invites us to take on God's very different, far more wonderful perspective. Isaiah asks us to see everything with new eyes, God's eyes. It is delightful to see a child who thinks they can disappear from view simply by closing their eyes. Rob Marsh SJ points out that, up to the age of about four years, we do not fully appreciate that others have minds with a different perspective from our own. Very young children think others see what they see, feel what they feel. But, at some stage, children shed their 'mind-blindness' and learn that others have thoughts, desires and perspectives different from their own. What does this tell us about our experience of God? Marsh makes the provocative suggestion that we tend to be mind-blind when it comes to God: 'We think that God knows simply what we know, sees simply what we see; and consequently we rarely stop to ask God what God actually sees or knows or feels.' The invitation, according to Marsh, is to ask God to remove our mind-blindness and acknowledge God as a real presence in our prayer, with His own perceptions, thoughts and desires. How often in my prayer do I take the trouble to ask God how He feels about what I am telling Him? Even more importantly, how often do I hang around for long enough to notice how He responds? Fortunately, on rare occasions at least, God does break through our self-preoccupation, and succeeds – finally! – in distracting us from ourselves. From our side, a lively curiosity about how things look to God prepares the ground for discernment. 'How does God look at this situation in my life? What does He want for me in this context? I don't know but I'm excited to find out!' As we hear in scripture, 'Look to the Lord and his strength; seek his face always.' (1 Chronicles 16:11) Francis himself is someone fascinated, not by his own navel, but by the gaze of Christ. He frequently exhorts us to be open to the graced experience that has been transformative for him: noticing how God sees the world, how God sees us. Standing before him with open hearts, letting him look at us, we see that gaze of love which Nathaniel glimpsed on the day when Jesus said to him: 'I saw you under the fig tree' (John 1:48).' By discernment we are invited to notice, to glimpse, to sense how things are 'from within God's own heart.'

Discernment as a spiritual sense

How do we go about attuning ourselves to God's perspective? Modern minds can find it difficult to acknowledge forms of perception other than scientific, rational knowledge. Yet, according to Pope Francis, discernment – perhaps like moral or aesthetic perception – is a kind of knowing that goes beyond rational knowledge: As part of his mysterious love for

humanity, God furnishes the totality of the faithful with an instinct of faith – *sensus Fidei* – which helps them to discern what is truly of God. The presence of the Spirit gives Christians certain connaturality with divine realities, and a wisdom which enables them to grasp those realities intuitively, even when they lack the wherewithal to give them precise expression. Here Francis describes discernment as wisdom, instinct, intuition. As baptized people, we experience ‘connaturality’ an affinity, a resonance with the spiritual. We have an experiential knowledge about what is of God, and what is contrary, by sensing its consonance or dissonance with the life of the Spirit within us. Discernment can therefore be described as a kind of spiritual sense. Growing in discernment is like developing a spiritual ‘ear’ for the ‘music of the Spirit’.⁸ The other senses also provide useful metaphors: discernment is a cultivated ‘nose’ for the presence of God, a sharp ‘eye’ for the fingerprints of God, an acquired ‘feel’ for what comes from the good spirit, an educated ‘taste’ for what savours of the Holy Spirit. As with all these sensory capacities, discernment is not just a piece of perceptual apparatus, but a facility that can be cultivated. I am far from being a wine connoisseur: I confess I would be unable to tell the difference between a fine vintage and a bottle of plonk. Yet I have also met a professional wine taster who has educated his smell and taste to discern the many aromas, tastes and textures of a wine. Similarly, through attentiveness, we can fine-tune our spiritual senses of discernment, our ability to tell the difference between good and bad ‘spirits’ in our experience. This cultivated sensibility is precious because it alerts us to what would sabotage our progress and helps us attune ourselves to the life-giving music of the Spirit.

Discernment as gift

Given that facility in discernment can be honed, we may be tempted to imagine it to be a technical skill to be mastered, somewhat like integral calculus. It is true that the wisdom of note, with Pope Francis, that discernment is not primarily a matter of technique. Even Ignatius’s rules are not a recipe for automatic results. For, Pope Francis reminds us, discernment is first and foremost a gift. When Francis spoke to the group of newly ordained bishops about discernment, he exhorted them to ask for the gift discernment again and again. Francis recalls the famous prayer of Solomon, who famously asked at Gibeon for the capacity to discern (1 Kings 3:5-12). We must, then, ‘continually return to Gibeonin prayer’, imploring the gift that Solomon valued above long life and riches. Like any gift, discernment must be received with openness, at the time of the giver’s choosing. Francis reflects, therefore, on the need for patience in discernment, a patience that is not passive resignation, but active reliance on God’s good timing: An essential condition for progressing in discernment is to educate ourselves in the patience of God and his times, which are never our own. He does not ‘bid fire upon the infidels’ (cf. Lk 9:53-54), nor does he permit zealots to ‘pull the weeds from the field’ that

they see growing there (cf. Mt 13:27-29). Discernment, for Francis, means not rushing ahead of graces given, but learning to follow God's lead. This waiting on God often requires an act of radical trust in periods of uncertainty and unclarity. The space that the poet John Keats called 'negative capability', that is, 'when a man is capable of being in uncertainties, Mysteries, doubts, without any irritable reaching after fact and reason',¹² is a mysteriously fertile one, in which the seed of discernment can grow and bear fruit. As Francis generously shares from his own experience: It is true that this trust in the unseen (Spirit) can cause us to feel disoriented: it is like being plunged into the deep and not knowing what we will find. I myself have frequently experienced this. Yet there is no greater freedom than that of allowing oneself to be guided by the Holy Spirit, renouncing the attempt to plan and control everything to the last detail, and instead letting him enlighten, guide and direct us, leading us wherever he wills. (*Evangelii Gaudium*, § 280). A discerning person does not precipitously reach for a resolution, but exercises the 'negative capability' to wait patiently for God's guidance. Once again, what is needed is not a technique that infallibly produces results, but a deeply personal, relational attitude of heart: a trust, an inner freedom, a readiness. 'Here I am, Lord, I have come to do your will.' (Hebrews 10:9)

Letting go and letting God lead us

There is much more that could be said about Pope Francis' understanding of what it means to discern. For example, he describes discernment as a kind of wisdom in the grey areas of life, an ability to discern the wheat amidst the weeds.¹³ Or he sees discernment as urging and guiding us along a path not of instant perfection but gradual progress, asking of us always to take the next, small step forward. And he talks of a discerning Church as a Church of mutual listening, one in which everyone listens humbly to each other so as to listen to the Holy Spirit.¹⁵ We are only just beginning to explore Francis' vision for a discerning Church.

Here I have touched on just three of the aspects of Pope Francis' thinking about spiritual discernment, the graced practice of letting go and letting God lead us. For Francis, discernment is a new perspective, a spiritual sense, a gift. In praying to become more discerning, we can therefore ask God to help us take on His way of looking at things, to give us an ear for the music of the Spirit, and to keep us open, in blessed uncertainty, to the Spirit's promptings as a gift. Francis exhorts all of us to grow in this invaluable Christian practice: 'Each Christian and every community must discern the path that the Lord points out'. The discerning pope invites us to learn an active receptiveness to the Spirit, 'letting him enlighten, guide and direct us, leading us wherever he wills.'

We Pray for those who have suffered harm from members of the Church; may they find within the Church herself a concrete response to their pain and suffering.


V. LENTEN MESSAGE OF THE HOLY FATHER: Our Lenten journey is Synodal

In his Message for Lent 2023, Pope Francis highlights the relationship between the Lenten journey and the Synodal journey, which are both rooted in tradition and open to newness.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Personal and ecclesial “transfiguration” is the goal of the ascetical journey of Lent, and similarly

of the synodal process, writes Pope Francis in his Message for Lent 2023. The message, signed on the Solemnity of the Conversion of St Paul and released on Friday, bears the title “Lenten Penance and the Synodal Journey.”



Our Lenten journey is Synodal

Pope Francis takes his inspiration from the Gospel account of the Transfiguration, proclaimed each year on the Second Sunday of Lent. As with the chosen disciples at the Transfiguration, Jesus “takes us with Him to a place apart” during the season of Lent. “Lenten penance,” he writes, “is a commitment, sustained by grace, to overcoming our lack of faith and our resistance to following Jesus on the way of the cross.”

This requires effort, sacrifice, and concentration, which are also requirements for the Synodal Journey; and therefore we can say that “our Lenten journey is ‘Synodal’ since we make it together along the same path, as disciples of the one Master.” “Both in the liturgical journey and in the journey of the Synod, the Church does nothing other than enter ever more deeply and fully into the mystery of Christ the Saviour.”

Helping us understand God's will

Like the journey of the disciples up Mount Tabor, Pope Francis acknowledges that the Synodal process can seem arduous and lead to discouragement. Yet, he says “what awaits us at the end is undoubtedly something wondrous and amazing, which will help us to understand better God's will and our mission in the world.”

Pointing to the appearance of Moses and Elijah – representing the Law and the Prophets – at the Transfiguration, Pope Francis says, “In a similar way, the Synodal journey is rooted in the

Church's tradition and at the same time open to newness." He explains that "tradition is a source of inspiration for seeking new paths and for avoiding the opposed temptations of immobility and improvised experimentation."

Listening and daily effort

In order to reach our goal of personal and ecclesial transformation or conversion, Pope Francis proposes two paths inspired by the Transfiguration of Jesus. The first is listening to God's Word and to our brothers and sisters. The Pope reminds us that listening to Christ often takes place in listening to our brothers and sisters in the Church.

The second path involves facing the reality of the daily struggles of life, without getting caught up in extraordinary events and experiences. Pope Francis reminds us that neither Lent nor the synodal process are ends in themselves, but are leading us to the experience of Easter.

"Let us go down then, to the plain," the Pope says in conclusion, "and may the grace we have experienced strengthen us to be 'artisans of Synodality' in the ordinary life of our communities."

VI. Conference of Catholic Bishops of India: XXXIV PLENARY ASSEMBLY MESSAGE

THEME: 'Telling the Story of Jesus in our Context: The Synodal Way'

January 24-30, 2023, St. John's National Academy of Health Sciences, Bengaluru.

We, the members of the Conference of Catholic Bishops of India (CCBI), came together for the 34th Plenary Assembly from 24 to 30 January 2023, at St. John's National Academy of Health Sciences, Bengaluru. We prayed, reflected on and discussed the theme: '**Telling the Story of Jesus in our Context: The Synodal Way.**'

The Church, as the People of God, is the icon of the Holy Trinity, called to live in communion of love by participating in the one mission which emanates from the Triune God. The Apostle John testifies: "*That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we looked upon and have touched with our hands, concerning the word of life... we have seen it, and testify to it and proclaim to you the eternal life ...*" (1 John 1:1-2). This calls for a personal encounter with our Lord Jesus Christ, which itself urges us to live and joyfully share the Good News in our context. Christ commissioned his Apostles: "*Go into all the world and proclaim the gospel to the whole creation*" (Mark 16:15). The Church continues this mission, living it by her words and deeds. This Good News is Jesus Christ himself, in whom God's love in all its fullness is manifested to the whole of humanity. The Church, in the midst of her ups and downs, lights and shadows, successes and struggles, has striven to be faithful in bearing witness to this love of God in our beloved Motherland.

Down the centuries, millions have been attracted to the person of Jesus Christ and his salvific message and have become his followers. Through them the story of Jesus is told and retold, fulfilling what the Church has been proclaiming from the very beginning: *“Truly I understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him”* (Acts 10:34-35).

This love of God is lived and experienced first and foremost in the family, where the story of Jesus is recounted by grandparents and parents to their children in various ways, by reading Bible stories, praying together and participating in popular devotions. The faith life is further nourished and sustained in the larger family of the parish, where the celebration of the Holy Eucharist occupies the central place. The proclamation and the breaking of the word play an essential and prominent role in all the liturgical celebrations. The Holy Eucharist is the sacrament in which the community is being transformed into the body of Christ, where *“There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus”* (Galatians 3:28).

The story of Jesus is read, lived and shared in a dynamic manner and in a Synodal way in the Basic Ecclesial Communities (BEC). The Gospel sharing in the BECs (also known as SCCs/ BCCs) strengthens the bonds of communion and leads members to bear witness in society.

Witnessing to the love of Christ, the Church in India has substantially contributed to nation-building, especially through her engagement in the fields of education, healthcare and social uplift. Standing firm on the teachings of Christ, the Church has always upheld the dignity of the human person, stood for a just society, promoted peace and harmony and cared for the weak, the suffering and the deprived sections of society.

From the very beginning, ordained ministers, along with women and men in consecrated life and ably supported by catechists, have been serving their communities both within and outside the Church, through committed pastoral care. The participatory bodies and lay associations foster communion and involvement of the members of the body of Christ in the mission of the Church.

The Catholic Church in India recognizes the changing circumstances and growing challenges she has to face, but has never ceased to tell the story of Jesus. A few challenges have been identified:

- Changing social conditions and the excessive use of social media, mobiles and internet have placed enormous pressure on the harmonious life of families.
- Addictions to drugs, alcohol and pornography are ruining the lives of many young adults, causing disruptions within families and in society.

- Poverty and inhuman living conditions deprive a substantial part of our population of equitable opportunity and dignity of life, creating uncertainties about their future.
- Massive displacement of peoples, loss of land and fishing rights in the name of industrial and corporate development result in forced migration, dispossession, loss of livelihood and further marginalization.
- Greed and consumeristic life styles are eroding the life of faith and centrality of prayer.
- Some civil legislations and policies often seriously hamper pastoral engagements of the Church in India.
- Misuse of anti-conversion laws in some States and false propaganda about ‘forced conversions’ are discouraging and hindering the life and service of the Christian community. This calls into question the Constitutional rights of the minorities.
- The growing culture of intolerance, hatred and even violent attacks on Christians in some quarters is a matter of grave concern to Christians in India.

In the present context, the story of Jesus needs to be told even more courageously, creatively and authentically, considering that the Good News is to be proclaimed in season and out of season (cf. 2 Timothy 4:2). Assured by the words of Jesus: *“I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world”* (John 16:33), we continue to tell the story of Jesus, by the power of the Holy Spirit, that God loves everyone unconditionally.

Following the Synodal Way, let us:

- Accompany youth and families so that faith is deepened, family prayer is nurtured, and the bonds of communion are strengthened; also, foster respect for life from the moment of conception to natural death.
- As grandparents, parents and elders, continue to transmit the story of Jesus to the younger generations.
- As pastors and consecrated persons, take more seriously our responsibility to care for families, individuals and all to whom we are sent.

International Women’s Day is a global day celebrating the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women. The day also marks a call to action for accelerating gender parity. Significant activity is witnessed worldwide as groups come together to celebrate women’s achievements or rally for women’s equality. Marked annually on **March 8th**, International



Women’s Day (IWD) is one of the most important days of the year to:

- celebrate women’s achievements
- raise awareness about women’s equality
- lobby for accelerated gender parity
- fundraise for **female-focused charities**

What's the theme for International Women's Day?

The campaign theme for International Women's Day 2023 is **"Embrace Equity."**

Do we still need an International Women's Day?

Yes! There's no place for complacency. According to the World Economic Forum, sadly none of us will see gender parity in our lifetimes, and nor likely will many of our children. Gender parity will not be attained for almost a century.

VIII. Solemnity of St. Joseph: Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary (March 19)

St. Joseph was an ordinary manual laborer although descended from the royal house of David. In the designs of Providence he was destined to become the spouse of the Mother of God. His high privilege is expressed in a single phrase, "Foster-father of Jesus." About him Sacred Scripture has little more to say than that he was a just man—an expression which indicates how faithfully he fulfilled his high trust of protecting and guarding God's greatest treasures upon earth, Jesus and Mary.



The darkest hours of his life may well have been those when he first learned of Mary's pregnancy; but precisely in this time of trial Joseph showed himself great. His suffering, which likewise formed a part of the work of the redemption, was not without great providential import: Joseph was to be, for all times, the trustworthy witness of the Messiah's virgin birth. After this, he modestly retires into the background of holy Scripture. Of St. Joseph's death the Bible tells us nothing. There are indications, however, that he died before the beginning of Christ's public life. His was the most beautiful death that one could have, in the arms of Jesus and Mary. Humbly and unknown, he passed his years at Nazareth, silent and almost forgotten he remained in the background through centuries of Church history. Only in more recent times has he been accorded greater honor. Liturgical veneration of St. Joseph began in the fifteenth century, fostered by Sts. Brigid of Sweden and Bernadine of Siena. St. Teresa, too, did much to further his cult. At present there are two major feasts in his honor. On March 19 our veneration is directed to him personally and to his part in the work of redemption, while on May 1 we honor him as the patron of workmen throughout the world and as our guide in the difficult matter of establishing equitable norms regarding obligations and rights in the social order.

IX. The Feast of the Annunciation (March 25)

The Feast of the Annunciation is one of the most important in the Church calendar. First, it celebrates the actual Incarnation of Our Savior - the Word made flesh in the womb of His mother, Mary. Second, it is a principal Marian feast. Two other feasts honoring Our Lord's mother, the Assumption (August 15), and the Immaculate Conception (December 8), are



celebrated as Holy Days of Obligation in the United States. The biblical account of the Annunciation is in the first chapter of the Gospel of St. Luke, which describes the news given to Mary that she was to become the mother of the Incarnation of God, records the “angelic salutation” of Gabriel to Mary, ‘Hail, thou who art highly favored. The Lord is with thee.’ This is the origin of the repeated “Hail Mary” prayer of the Rosary); and Mary’s response to God’s will, “Let it be done to me according to thy word.” Her exultant hymn, the Magnificent, found in Luke 1:46-55, has been part of the Church’s liturgy of the hours, at Vespers (evening prayer), and has been repeated nightly in churches, convents and monasteries for many centuries.

The significance of this Christian feast on Western culture is made clear from the fact that New Years Day used to be celebrated on March 25. This was the case in England until as late as 1752. Another remnant of the historic universality of Christianity in the world is the universal use of BC (before Christ) and AD (Anno Domini — The Year of Our Lord) to denote periods of time in history. Although there has been an attempt in some circles to change ‘BC’ to ‘BCE’ (before the common era), AD to CE (common era), and although it is true that the religious significance of our system of dating has been effectively obliterated, nevertheless, Christians and non-Christians alike consent to the birth of Christ as the “fulcrum” of the dating the events of human history.


