**Our Lady of Fatima Solemnity
Popular Devotional Practices
“Worship the Father in Spirit and Truth” (Jn 4: 24”)**

Latria, Hyperdulia and Dulia: Adoration, Veneration and Reverence

As the Solemnity of Our Lady of Fatima is at the door step, a strong ardour of affection and piety to Mother Mary reveals People’s Faith in the things of God, Veneration of Mary is a catholic devotion and by the term “popular devotions”, we commonly understand those external practices of piety by which the devotion of the faithful finds life and expression. The efficacy of these practices in eliciting feelings of devotion is derived from by the strong appeal which they make to man’s emotional instincts. Fatima Feast or devotion to any Saint is not unbiblical nor is it mere human affection but the extension of the Liturgy. In Catholic tradition, a wide range of practices have developed, ranging from devotions to the Holy Trinity to specific saints. The three-level hierarchy of *latria, hyperdulia and dulia determines the appropriate type of worship or veneration*. *Latria* (from the Greek) is used for worship, adoration and reverence directed only to the Holy Trinity. *Dulia* (from the Greek) is the kind of honor given to the communion of saints, while the Blessed Virgin Mary is honored with *hyperdulia*, a higher form of *dulia* but lower than *latria*.



Liturgy and Devotions: Vatican II

As Vatican II pointed out very clearly, the life of the Church centers on the liturgy, the official public worship of God by the Church as the Body of Christ. The liturgy includes, above all, the Eucharist and the other six Sacraments, but also other actions of the Church such as the daily Prayer of the Liturgy of the Hours, the rites of Christian burial, and the rites for the dedication of a church or for those making Religious profession. Christ himself is at work in the liturgy, so that the action of the Church, which is the Body of Christ, participates in the saving act of Christ as priest. Precisely because every liturgical celebration “is an action of Christ the priest and of His Body which is the Church,” no other form of worship can take its place: a liturgical celebration “is a sacred action surpassing all others; no other action of the Church can equal its efficacy by the same title and to the same degree.”

While the liturgy is “the summit toward which the activity of the Church is directed” and “the font from which all her power flows,” it is not possible for us to fill up all of our day with participation in the liturgy. The Council pointed out that the spiritual life “is not limited solely to participation in the liturgy. . . according to the teaching of the apostle, [the Christian] must pray without ceasing.” (SC 13). Popular devotional practices play a crucial role in helping to foster this ceaseless prayer. The faithful have always used a variety of practices as a means of permeating everyday life with prayer to God. Examples include Catholic devotions to the Sacred Heart, the Eucharist, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and other saints or sacred events. These prayers and practices remain popular because they reflect a homespun religiosity that speaks

to the lived experience of the faithful throughout history along with pilgrimages, novenas, processions and celebrations in honor of Mary and the other Saints, the Rosary, the *Angelus*, the Stations of the Cross, the veneration of Relics, observing the month of the Rosary in October and the month of Mary in May and the use of Sacramentals. Properly used, popular devotional practices do not replace the liturgical life of the Church, rather, they extend it into daily life.

Congregation for Divine Worship

This Dicastery published a *Directory on Popular Piety and the Liturgy*. Catholic devotions have various forms, ranging from formalized, multi-day prayers such as novenas to activities, such as processions or the Eucharistic adoration, the wearing of scapulars, the veneration of the saints, the Canonical coronations of sacred Marian or Christological images with the Common examples of Catholic devotions are the Way of the Cross, the Rosary, the Angelus and various litanies, devotions to the Blessed Sacrament, the Sacred Heart, the Immaculate Heart of Mary and the Holy Face of Jesus, pilgrimages, observing the month of the Rosary in October and the month of Mary in May. Several factors shape the efficacy of devotional practices in eliciting feelings of devotion: a strong emotional appeal, simplicity of form which puts them within the reach of all, the association with many others engaged in the same practices, and their derivation from the example of others considered to lead a holy life. Since the Middle Ages, popes have encouraged devotions such as Eucharistic adoration, the Rosary and the Stations of the Cross, while maintaining the primacy of liturgy over private devotions.

Novenas and Prayers

The Pentecost Novena to the Holy Spirit is traditionally prayed especially during the nine days between the Ascension Thursday and Pentecost. The practice of novenas derives from the nine days spent in prayer by the Apostles and Disciples together with Mary from the Ascension until the Descent of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost (Acts 1:14). This is considered to have been the first novena. The Angelus is a traditional prayer used to commemorate the Incarnation. It consists essentially in the triple repetition of the Hail Mary, to which in later times have been added three introductory versicles and a concluding versicle and prayer. It is prayed three times daily: at dawn, mid-day and at dusk. During Eastertide, the Angelus is replaced with the Regina Coeli an antiphon, dating from the tenth or eleventh century. The Rosary, or Psalter of the Blessed Virgin Mary is essentially a contemplative prayer. Family recitation of the rosary is encouraged. Pope Pius XII said regarding the custom of the family recitation of the Holy Rosary and at eventide, the Christian home resounds with the frequent repetition of praises in honor of the High Queen of Heaven. The Litany of Loreto is the most well-known Marian litany.

Fatima Feast, Hyperdulia to Mary, Mother of God


Let Our Patroness feast be meaningful Adoration of the Trinity and a genuinespontaneous affection of the Faithful towards Mary. May it link all more tightly in a sweet bond of love, with the most Holy Virgin, who, like a loving mother, mould us as Jesus true disciples with “Do what He tells You” (Jn 2: 5).

II. Holy Father's Intention: For the New Martyrs

We Pray that those who risk their lives for the Gospel in various parts of the world inflame the Church with their courage and missionary enthusiasm.

III. Lenten Message of the Holy Father: Lent is a time of conversion and freedom

In his message for Lent 2024, Pope Francis invites the faithful to “pause” for prayer and to assist our brothers and sisters in need, in order to change our own lives and the lives of our communities. “When our God reveals Himself, His message is always one of freedom,” Pope Francis says in the opening of his Message to the faithful for Lent 2024. Recalling the Exodus of the Hebrew people from Egypt, the Holy Father explains that our journey through the desert can be a season of grace – not an abstract journey, but a concrete path that involves seeing the world as it is and hearing the cries of our oppressed brothers and sisters.



Countering a globalization of indifference

The Pope insisted on the need to counter a “globalization of indifference.” “Our Lenten journey will be concrete if... we realize that even today we remain under the rule of Pharaoh. A rule that makes us weary and indifferent. A model of growth that divides us and robs us of our future.” At the same time, Pope Francis reminded us that it is God who takes the initiative. Too often, he said, there remains within us “an inexplicable longing for slavery,” a desire to cling to idols that paralyze us, as Israel was paralyzed in the desert.

Lent, however, is a “season of grace, a time of conversion,” where the desert can become “a place where our freedom can mature in a personal decision not to fall back into slavery,” where “we find new criteria of justice and a community with which we can press forward on a road not yet taken.”

Pausing for prayer and to help our neighbour

He added that the Lenten journey involves a struggle. It is a time for action, the Pope said, but also a time “to pause” – to pause in prayer and to pause “in the presence of a wounded brother or sister.” “Love of God and love of neighbour are one love,” Pope Francis continued, explaining that “the contemplative dimension” of Lent can help us “release new energies,” to be “more sensitive to one another: in the place of threats and enemies, we discover companions and fellow travelers.”

‘A flash of new hope’

Pope Francis concluded his Lenten message on a hopeful note: “To the extent that this Lent becomes a time of conversion, an anxious humanity will notice a burst of creativity, a flash of new hope.” Calling on the faithful to “be ready to take risks,” he invited them “to find the courage to see our world, not as in its death throes, but in a process of giving birth; not at the end, but at the beginning of a great new chapter of history.”

“Faith and charity,” he said, “take hope, this small child, by the hand. They teach her to walk, and at the same time, she leads them forward.”

IV. International Women's Day (March 8)

International Women's Day is a global day celebrating the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women. The day also marks a call to action for accelerating gender parity. Significant activity is witnessed worldwide as groups come together to celebrate women's achievements or rally for women's equality. Marked annually on **March 8th**, International Women's Day (IWD) is one of the most important days of the year to:


- celebrate women's achievements
- raise awareness about women's equality
- lobby for accelerated gender parity
- fundraise for **female-focused charities**

What's the theme for International Women's Day?

The campaign theme for International Women's Day 2024 is "**Inspire Inclusion.**"

Do we still need an International Women's Day?

Yes! There's no place for complacency. According to the World Economic Forum, sadly none of us will see gender parity in our lifetimes, and nor likely will many of our children. Gender parity will not be attained for almost a century.



V. Solemnity of St. Joseph: Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary (March 19)

St. Joseph was an ordinary manual laborer although descended from the royal house of David. In the designs of Providence he was destined to become the spouse of the Mother of God. His high privilege is expressed in a single phrase, "Foster-father of Jesus." About him Sacred Scripture has little more to say than that he was a just man—an expression which indicates how faithfully he fulfilled his high trust of protecting and guarding God's greatest treasures upon earth, Jesus and Mary.



The darkest hours of his life may well have been those when he first learned of Mary's pregnancy; but precisely in this time of trial Joseph showed himself great. His suffering, which likewise formed a part of the work of the redemption, was not without great providential import: Joseph was to be, for all times, the trustworthy witness of the Messiah's virgin birth. After this, he modestly retires into the background of holy Scripture. Of St. Joseph's death the Bible tells us nothing. There are indications, however, that he died before the beginning of Christ's public life. His was the most beautiful death that one could have, in the arms of Jesus and Mary. Humbly and unknown, he passed his years at Nazareth, silent and almost forgotten he remained in the background through centuries of Church history. Only in more recent times has he been accorded greater honor. Liturgical veneration of St. Joseph began in the fifteenth century, fostered by Sts. Brigid of Sweden and Bernadine of Siena. St. Teresa, too, did much to further his cult. At present there are two major feasts in his honor. On March 19 our veneration is directed to him personally and to his part in the work

of redemption, while on May 1 we honor him as the patron of workmen throughout the world and as our guide in the difficult matter of establishing equitable norms regarding obligations and rights in the social order.

VI. The Feast of the Annunciation (March 25)

The Feast of the Annunciation is one of the most important in the Church calendar. First, it celebrates the actual Incarnation of Our Savior — the Word made flesh in the womb of His mother, Mary. Second, it is a principal Marian feast. Two other feasts honoring Our Lord’s mother, the Assumption (August 15), and the Immaculate Conception (December 8), are celebrated as Holy Days of Obligation in the United States. The biblical account of the Annunciation



is in the first chapter of the Gospel of St. Luke, which describes the news given to Mary that she was to become the mother of the Incarnation of God, records the “angelic salutation” of Gabriel to Mary, ‘Hail, thou who art highly favored. The Lord is with thee.’ This is the origin of the repeated “Hail Mary” prayer of the Rosary); and Mary’s response to God’s will, “Let it be done to me according to thy word.” Her exultant hymn, the Magnificat, found in Luke 1:46-55, has been part of the Church’s liturgy of the hours, at Vespers (evening prayer), and has been repeated nightly in churches, convents and monasteries for many centuries.

The significance of this Christian feast on Western culture is made clear from the fact that New Years Day used to be celebrated on March 25. This was the case in England until as late as 1752. Another remnant of the historic universality of Christianity in the world is the universal use of BC (before Christ) and AD (Anno Domini — The Year of Our Lord) to denote periods of time in history. Although there has been an attempt in some circles to change ‘BC’ to ‘BCE’ (before the common era), AD to CE (common era), and although it is true that the religious significance of our system of dating has been effectively obliterated, nevertheless, Christians and non-Christians alike consent to the birth of Christ as the “fulcrum” of the dating the events of human history.

VII. Paschal Triduum

The Latin word Triduum means a period of three days. The Easter Triduum unfolds the Paschal Mystery of Jesus Christ. It is the culmination of all liturgical celebrations during the year. During the Easter Triduum, Christians commemorate the central events of their Salvation. Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday with the Easter Vigil run through the essential core of Christian faith: the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ. By participating in the Easter Triduum, Christians want to awaken in them the living memory of the sufferings that the Jesus Christ endured for them.



They prepare their hearts to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. For Christians, Easter is the biggest day in the liturgical year.

On **Holy Thursday**, Christians enact the Last Supper, in which the Lord Jesus, on the eve of his Passion and Death, instituted the Sacrament of the Eucharist and the Sacrament of the ministerial Priesthood. The traditional English name for this day, Maundy Thursday, comes from the Latin phrase *mandatum novum* – a new command – which comes from Jesus' words: "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another" (Jn 13: 34). On Maundy Thursday, Jesus established the new commandment of love. During the Mass on Maundy Thursday, Christians remember that Jesus Christ gave his body and blood to them as a remedy for immortality. Therefore, the Eucharist became the source and Summit of Christian life. With the humble and expressive gesture of the washing of the feet, Christians are invited to recall what the Lord Jesus did for his apostles: by washing their feet he concretely proclaimed the primacy of love. He also anticipated the supreme sacrifice of his life which would be consumed the next day on the Calvary.

Good Friday is a day to commemorate the Passion, Cross, and death of Jesus Christ. It's a day of fasting. The liturgy of Good Friday consists of three parts: the liturgy of the Word, the veneration of the Cross and the reception of the Holy Communion. On Good Friday, there is no Mass because Christians keep the somber and mournful atmosphere of the day. The Body of Christ distributed on Good Friday is consecrated on Maundy Thursday. On Good Friday, Christians remember the humiliation that Christ Jesus undertook for the entire humanity. By dying on the Cross, Jesus takes the suffering and sin of the entire humanity upon him. The veneration of the Cross recalls to the Christians that Cross of Jesus Christ became a sign of victory on Good Friday. The participation in the Way of Cross helps Christians to associate themselves with the sufferings of Christ.

Holy Saturday is marked by profound silence. The Churches are stripped and no special liturgical celebration is foreseen except the Easter Vigil. Waiting for the great event of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ, Christians persevere with Mary in praying and meditating. On Holy Saturday, great importance is given to participation in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, an indispensable way to purify the heart and prepare to celebrate Easter. Saturday of silence, meditation, forgiveness and reconciliation will lead Christians to the Easter Vigil. At the heart of the night, the Paschal candle, the symbol of Jesus Christ in glory, is lit from the new fire. Jesus Christ, the light of humanity, dispels the darkness of heart and mind and illuminates every human being who comes into the World. All the faithful gathered join in procession back to the main sanctuary. The Priest carries the Paschal candle, lifting it three different times and chanting: "Christ our Light". The people respond by singing: "Thanks be to God". All people in the Church light their candles from the Paschal candle and then they process into the sanctuary. Then, the Exultet is sung by the deacon or cantor. It is a hymn of praise to God for the light of the Paschal candle from 4th century, from the time of Saint Ambrose.

It is a beautiful song of light and glory: Rejoice, O earth, in shining splendor, Radiant in the brightness of your King! Christ has conquered! Glory fills you! Darkness vanishes forever!... May the Morning Star which never sets Find this flame still burning: Christ, that Morning Star,

Who came back from the dead, And shed his peaceful light on all mankind, Your Son, who lives and reigns forever and ever. Amen.

The Easter Vigil affirms that Christ is truly Risen and death has no power over Him. By his death he has conquered evil forever and has given to all humans the very life of God. The Bible readings during the celebration give an overview of salvation history and God's interventions into time and space from the time of Creation till today. From the ancient time, the Easter Vigil was also the celebration for adult converts to be baptized and enter the Church. The catechumens received the Sacrament of Baptism and all faithful renewed their baptismal promises.

Easter Sunday is a day of joy and celebration. Christians celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ. The time of fasting and penance is over! Christians sing Alleluia to glorify God for all marvelous things that happen in their life. They fill their life from the life of the Risen Lord Jesus Christ. Thousands of pilgrims come to the Churches during the Easter Triduum to participate in different celebrations. They come from different walks of life. Rich and poor, healthy and sick, big and small, belonging to different cultures and backgrounds, people come to participate in the Divine Mystery of Jesus Christ.

VIII. Solemnity of Easter- March 31

The life of our Lord on earth did not end with the Resurrection. There still remained the important and difficult task of convincing these fearful, doubting apostles of his that he had risen as he said he would. It wasn't easy. It took forty days and many appearances to do this. The Gospels during this Easter Season have been about these appearances. The important lesson for us in all of these appearances of the Risen Jesus is that the joy and the power of the Resurrection is not to be found in the empty tomb or in the testimony of someone else. It is to be found only in a personal encounter, with the Risen Jesus. The empty tomb did nothing for Mary Magdalene. She thought that the gardener or someone else



had taken the body away, and there was only tears, disappointment and sorrow. It was when Mary recognized and embraced the Risen Jesus that she experienced the joy and the power of the Resurrection. Two disciples were on the road to Emmaus getting out of town. The empty tomb and the fact that some women told them that an angel said he had risen didn't convince them either. Then they had an encounter with the Risen Jesus in the form of a stranger. Finally, they recognize him in the breaking of bread and are so filled with joy that they turn around and hurry back to the city to spread the good news. The empty tomb and the testimony of the others did nothing for the apostles either. They thought that it was all over. They locked themselves in a room for fear that they too would be crucified. Then they encountered the Risen Jesus. "Peace be with you. As the father has sent me, so I send you," he said to them. Suddenly, these cowardly apostles are transformed into fearless martyrs who defy the chief priest and are willing to suffer death, "rejoicing to be found worthy to suffer something for the name of Jesus."

1. Hearty Congratulations to Msgr. Fr Prakash Sagili new Bishop of Khammam

The Holy Father has appointed Fr Prakash Sagili as the Bishop of Khammam. Bishop Udumala Bala, Bishop of Warangal & Apostolic Administrator of Khammam announced his appointment in Karunagiri Cathedral, Khammam Diocese at 4: 30 pm on 17-02-2024. He is the clergy of Cuddapah, currently parish priest of St. John Bosco in Chittor and coordinator of the CCBI Health Apostolate. He was born on 2 January 1957. After attending St. Peter's Minor Seminary in Cuddapah and the Christ the King Seminary in Vijayawada, he continued his formation at the Sacred Heart Seminary in Poonamallee, Chennai.



He was ordained a priest on 25 April 1984. He held the following positions and carried out further studies: Deputy Parish Priest in Badvel (1984); Director of Youth and Pastoral Center (1985-1987); Parish Priest in Mydukur and Secretary Multipurpose Social Service Society (1986); Regional Youth Director, Andhra Pradesh (1987-1993); parish priest in Proumamilla (1993-1995); National Director of Youth Movements India (1995-2001); Director Chittoor Multipurpose Social Service Society (2001-2003); Vicar General of Cuddapah and Parish Priest at Arogyamatha Shrine (2002-2007); Director of St. John's Hospital, Bangalore (2008-2011); Doctorate in Sociology from Shri Venkateswara University Thirupathi (2013); Parish Priest in Sivadi (2011-2015) and of St. Mary's Cathedral in Cuddapah (2015-2020): since 2020, Parish Priest of St. John Bosco in Chittor and, since 2021, Coordinator of the CCBI Health Apostolate.

2. Hearty Congratulations to Msgr. Fr Karnam Dhaman Kumar, M.S.F.S. new Bishop of Nalgonda

The Holy Father has appointed Fr Karnam Dhaman Kumar, M.S.F.S., as Bishop of Nalgonda, currently Parish Priest of S. Bartolomäus in Münster and Superior Delegate of the M.S.F.S. Missionaries in Germany. The News was made public on 17-02-2024 at 4:30pm.



Fr Karnam Dhaman Kumar, M.S.F.S., was born on 16 November 1963 in Vijayanagaram, in the Archdiocese of Visakhapatnam, in the State of Andhra Pradesh. After the novitiate in the M.S.F.S. Congregation at the Salesianum in Visakhapatnam, he studied Philosophy at Suvidya College in Bangalore and Theology at Jnana Deepa Vidyapeeth in Pune.

He made his Perpetual Profession on 3 December 1989 and was ordained a priest on 17 October 1990.
